**Drought Conditions** – As you are aware, 100% of Utah is in drought. 2020 was one of the hottest and driest summers on record, our snowpack was well below average this year, and soil moisture is at an all-time low. Taking action now is critical – especially because we don't know how long these conditions will continue.

As irrigation water is now available, we ask everyone to please evaluate and monitor your outdoor water usage along with culinary water use. Visit <u>www.conservewater.utah.gov</u> for information on water conservation in Utah, a weekly lawn watering guide, water conservation plans, resources for waterwise plants, etc. <u>www.conservewater.utah.gov</u>. Future watering restrictions may be implemented as needed.

**Tree City USA –** Hyrum, Utah was named a 2020 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management. Hyrum achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

If ever there was a time for trees, now is that time. Communities worldwide are facing issues with air quality, water resources, personal health and well-being, energy use, and protection from extreme heat and flooding. The Arbor Day Foundation recently launched the Time for Trees initiative to address these issues, with unprecedented goals of planting 100 million trees in forests and communities and inspiring 5 million tree planters by 2022. With Tree City USA recognition, Hyrum has demonstrated a commitment to effective urban forest management and doing its part to help address these challenges for Hyrum residents now and in the future.

**Museum News** – Did you know that President Lyndon Johnson signed the Highway Safety Act on September 9, 1966 in response to the sky-rocketing deaths caused by motor-vehicle crashes? He noted that while 29 American soldiers died overseas in the Vietnam War that Labor Day weekend, 614 died on American soil in car crashes. This legislation mandated safety features such as head rests, shatter-resistant windshields, and safety belts; improved road conditions such as delineation of sharp curves, guardrails, and center barriers; and enacted many traffic-safety laws regarding speed and not driving while intoxicated. Throughout the Twentieth Century, the motorization of America has produced many eras of wonderful cars, including the great muscle cars of the 1960s--whose owners likely had a hard time adhering to the new speed limits. Be sure to join us at the Hyrum City Square on Saturday, June 12<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for the museum's annual car show fundraiser, Hot Wheels in Hyrum! We have already got a bunch of great cars registered and ready to come, so you won't want to miss it. We are also excited to have several food trucks joining us this year.

Summer means the return of our annual Passport to Summer Fun children's activity. Passports will be available at Hot Wheels in Hyrum and then at the museum during normal business hours starting Tuesday, June 15<sup>th</sup>. Along with a bunch of fun activities to do with your family, we will be hosting three drop-in activities starting with Rodeo Games at the museum on Tuesday, June 22<sup>nd</sup> from 1:00-3:00 p.m. Then, visit the Elite Hall for our Second Saturday event Grand Old Flag on Saturday, July 10<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Finally, come learn about Playing on Prairie at the museum on Thursday, July 22<sup>nd</sup> from 1:00-3:00 p.m. All three activities will be super fun, educational, and children of all ages are invited to participate.
