Drought Conditions – In response to ongoing concerns about extremely dry conditions, Gov. Spencer J. Cox issued an executive order for residential water users to consider the following conservation practices: delay outdoor irrigation or end irrigation early; follow the weekly lawn watering guide at https://conservewater.utah.gov/guide.html; fix irrigation inefficiencies; purchase and install a smartcontroller or low-flow toilet; reduce indoor water use by taking shorter showers, turning off water when not in use, and replacing appliances with water-efficient models; convert turf areas to waterwise landscapes; be an advocate of water efficiency by setting an example and help educate friends and neighbors on the importance of water conservation; and reduce indoor water waste.

Mollie Larson with Nucor Steel donated 34 trees to be planted at Hyrum City's East Park & City Square. National Night Out Against Crime – Hyrum will be hosting the annual National Night Out Against Crime on Tuesday, August 3rd at 6:30 p.m. on the City Square in conjunction with many communities across Utah and the United States. National Night Out, a yearlong community building campaign, is designed to: 1) heighten crime prevention awareness, 2) generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs, 3) strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships, and 4) send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Hyrum will be providing free hamburgers as well as hosting various law enforcement groups as well as other community service providers. These groups will have information available as well as demonstrations.
