Mayors Message – Hyrum's wastewater treatment facility was designed to last 15-20 years. We have exceeded that time by several years. We are meeting and exceeding all the requirements for high quality water after the wastewater has been treated. However, the plant is in need of significant planned upgrades which should be done by spring. We have \$1,200,000 in the city reserves to go towards this project. We also have been approved for a USDA loan of \$2,402,000. A federal grant has been awarded to the project for \$1,569,000 for a

combined total of \$5,171,000. The city was required to obtain an interim construction loan to be repaid by USDA at the end of construction. There is no penalty for early payoff of the loan which we plan to do.

This upgrade will increase our capacity from the current on paper 1.5-million-gallons a day to 3.6 million. We are currently only able to process about 1.2 due to the aging of the facility and worn out plates. Running the plant on a lesser load will extend the plant's life and allow for high water events. The new upgrade will save some on power use, also. Sewer rates have held steady for ten years. A small sewer rate increase has been approved by the City Council that will help pay for the loan.

It has been my pleasure to serve as your mayor. We live in a great community! I hope you enjoy living here as much as I do. Happy New Year!

Indoor Walking - Spend some time walking or jogging in the Elite Hall. The Elite Hall will be open to the public Monday thru Friday mornings from 7:00 to 10:00 a.m. for walkers and joggers. Everyone is welcome, but please remember that children must be supervised at all times and please no food or drinks other than water.

Winter Parking Restrictions – Parking is not allowed on city streets or within ten feet of roadway pavement in any municipal right-of-way between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 8:00 a.m. unless such vehicle is in a driveway approach or otherwise parked behind the curb where curb exists. This law allows for snow removal and is in effect between November 1st and April 1st, even when there is no snow.

Business Licenses – All current business licenses need to be renewed. If renewal is not made by January 31st a late fee will be assessed. If you are starting a new business, please come into the Hyrum City Office and pick up an application. There is a \$10 application fee plus the following: home occupation business \$20; and commercial business \$75. If you have any questions, please contact the city office.

Dog Licenses – Any dog(s) four (4) months or older is required to be licensed with Hyrum City. Dogs are required to be licensed even if they stay inside your home or never leave your yard. The license fees are as follows:

Neutered/Spayed dogs - \$12

Male/Female dogs - \$22

A veterinarian certificate is required to verify rabies vaccination and the dog being neutered or spayed. All dogs must be licensed by Friday, February 28th. After February 28th a \$5 late fee will be assessed in addition to the regular license fee. Owners will be issued a citation for failure to have his/her dog properly licensed. Also, please remember that City Ordinance permits a maximum of **two dogs per household**.

Snow Removal Policy – Snow removal from driveway and sidewalks: Section 12.04.010 of the Hyrum City Code requires property owners or occupants to remove snow from sidewalks abutting their properties within a "reasonable time" after the snow stops falling—the code stipulates 9 a.m. for snow accumulating during the night. This is especially critical for sidewalks used by school children and other pedestrians.

<u>Section 10.20.095</u> prohibits the practice of depositing, blowing, or pushing snow removed from parking <u>lots, driveways, or sidewalks onto the roadway.</u> This includes pushing it across roadways to neighboring park strips, borrow pits, or vacant properties in such manner as to leave a residue or otherwise increase the amount of snow on the roadway.

We ask that you place the snow on your side of the property line behind the sidewalks, allowing us to push the snow from the roads onto the park strips or borrow pits.

Priorities for snow removal: Snow removal priority is based upon the amount of traffic and the number of homes, businesses, and schools serviced by a particular road. Please keep in mind that the length and intensity of the storm influences plow routes and frequency of plowing.

Major storms require us to remain on primary roadways until the storm subsides.

Garbage cans in the road: We also ask that you put your garbage and recycle cans out the morning of collection day and remove them as soon as possible following the collection. These containers do not need to be placed on the asphalt portion of the roadway but rather set back several feet from the asphalt to reduce chances of damage by plows and flying snow.

Be aware of our equipment: A loaded snowplow weighs as much as 14 tons. The drivers need room to stop, especially while plowing. Even if you have the right-of-way, let the plow come to a stop before pulling out in front of it. We also ask that you remain more than 50 feet away from the plows so your vehicle is not damaged by flying snow or ice removal materials.

Museum News – Did you know that Utah women were at the forefront of the national suffrage movement including being the VERY FIRST women to vote in the United States? 2020 marks three significant women's rights anniversaries. First, it's the 150th anniversary of the first American women to vote under an equal suffrage law when twenty-five Utah women cast ballots in Salt Lake City on February 14, 1870. Second, 2020 is the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment, which extended voting rights to women throughout the United States. Third, it's the 55th anniversary of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which ensured suffrage to all citizens regardless of race. Kick-off this year of celebration at the museum by visiting in January to experience the traveling exhibit, "Utah Women Making History," which includes illustrations of Utah women (and a few men) who worked throughout the 20th Century to advocate for women and advance their communities. The exhibit will run from January 4th through January 29th.



Also, be sure to drop by the museum before the end of January to see student artwork from Lincoln Elementary and South Cache Middle School, which were Reflections winners and runners-up.
