Mayors Message – The fiscal year for the city's budget begins July 1st each year. The city treasurer, city administrator, city council, department heads and myself spend many hours getting the budget ready. The city council has final approval after a public hearing.

Completion of a new city hall constructed without bonding, new splash pad at Blacksmith Fork Park, remodeling of the Civic Center, and many new subdivisions approved and developed are some of the significant projects completed this past fiscal year.

The primary objective for Hyrum's upcoming fiscal year budget is to reduce outstanding debt for the city, paying off the remainder of the debt for the Hyrum Library as well as the city's water reuse bond. The budget includes \$364,125 for the new fire station which the city will be able to cover the cost without taking on debt because of the sale of the new stations previously agreed location at 100 East Main Street. We have decided to keep the fire station where it is now located instead of moving it.

Even though we are tightening our belts it will still leave money to do park improvements, road maintenance increases, trees and other beautification projects.

I hope you are enjoying the summer and taking advantage of the many things there are to do here in Hyrum.

City Council Meeting Summary – Lisa Swing's request for a home occupation business license at 58 North Center was approved. She will be growing and selling fruits and vegetables, flowers and herbs as well as raising and breeding registered dairy goats.

Utah Local Governments Trust presented Hyrum City with its Trust Accountability Program Award.

The council approved reducing the impact fees for sewer and culinary water for the Blacksmith Fork Willows Assisted Living Center

based on a standard household size in Cache County being 3.3 per household while the center will average just over one per living area.

Conditions and requirements for an annexation agreement were discussed, and site plan approved for a concrete ready mix batch plant at 380 North 1000 East with Kilgore Company, also known as Johnson Construction.

An amendment of the concept plan for Elk Mountain Planned Unit Development was made and approved. The amendment reduces the number of townhouses from 158 to 109, adds a 14 unit retirement apartment complex, adds ten retirement building lots and 150 unit multifamily apartment complex.

A resolution was passed amending the bail schedule for the animal ordinance, Title 6 of the Hyrum City Municipal Code.

A resolution amending and adopting the Canyon Lodge rental fee and deposit was passed.

A resolution was passed renewing our agreement with Questar Gas for the construction, operation and maintenance of a gas distribution system in Hyrum City.

A resolution approving a cable television franchise agreement between Comcast and Hyrum City was approved.

The information for this city newsletter is required a month before it is printed. Therefore the July council meeting hasn't taken place at the time this summary is composed.



Plug In to Energy Savings - (Information provided from A.P.P.A. American Public Power Association)According to the Consumer Electronics Association:

- Nearly 70 million households own at least one smartphone, which they charge at home.
- Three-fourths of all households own at least one high-definition TV; most have more than one.
- More than one-third of households do video streaming.
- 80% of households had at least one home computer in 2013, and one-fourth of all households planned to buy a new tablet or laptop computer in the next year.

Most of these devices use relatively little electricity, but small uses add up. Consumer electronics and "miscellaneous" devices represent the fastest growing segments of home energy use.

Many small electronics and appliances remain in standby mode and consume energy all the time. For some of these devices, the instant start-up, onboard clocks, and memory features are a great advantage. But the average household spends \$100 a year to power devices while they are off or in standby mode. Nationally, standby power accounts for more than \$10 billion in annual energy costs, according to Energy Star.

Check if you need to keep all of your devices plugged in (like the clock radio or TV in the guest room) and if they have power-saver settings. For example, computers should be set to go into "sleep mode" after five or 10 minutes without use. Screen savers do not save energy.

Most cell phone chargers and power adapters for MP3 players, cameras, laptops, etc., waste energy when they are plugged in but not in use. You can tell if the charger "brick" feels warm. Newer chargers tend to be more efficient, as the International Energy Agency has set efficiency targets for manufacturers worldwide.

Simple energy management tools can help you avoid energy waste. Use a power switch or smart strip. Plug in one to six devices and turn them on or off with the flip of a switch. Mount your power strips conveniently because you won't use them if they are hard to reach. In some cases, it is also worthwhile to use timers. If you know that your phone will charge in a few hours, you can set an outlet to provide power for only that many hours each night.
