Mayors Message – Hyrum City is recognized as a Tree City USA. This provides many benefits to the City, but also comes with problems that can arise with trees and how they affect our electrical service.

First, a little background on Hyrum's electrical department. The utility serves approximately 3,600 residential, commercial, and industrial customers. The utility buys most of its power from outside sources. Five of these sources are owned in part by Hyrum City: San Juan, Hunter II, IPP, Nebo Power Station, Pleasant Valley Wind Facility, and the Horse Butte Wind Project. The remainder comes from generating plants on the Colorado River, Richmond/Cove Irrigation Hydro, and Hyrum's own generating plant in Blacksmith Fork Canyon, which supplies less than four percent of the City's energy. Hyrum City owns and maintains over 100 miles of distribution lines throughout the city. Our system receives power

through high voltage transmission lines owned by Rocky Mountain Power which can occasionally be the reason for outages.

Hyrum City budgets 10 to 15 million dollars a year to purchase power, upgrade our electric utility, and other items needed to run that utility. Included in past annual budgets have been well over \$100,00 dollars for professional tree trimming. This year we have already spent \$150,000 to trim trees around power lines. Costs to purchase power are rising across the nation. Hyrum City recently completed a rate study, and some adjustments are anticipated in the near future.

Hyrum gets winds from several canyons that can be very strong at times. The past few years we have experienced major tree damage throughout the city, especially the cemetery, from higherthan-normal wind gusts and an early heavy snow that broke branches, tree trunks, and weakened trees. We are required to hire tree trimmers specialized and certified to trim trees around power lines. We are being proactive to avoid problems caused from tree branches to our electrical system. Generally, we are requiring underground power lines with new construction.

I was contacted by an angry business owner that said there was no excuse for the Hyrum City not to give forewarning of power outages. Unfortunately, we can't predict if there is going to be an accident where a power pole is hit, equipment failure or Mother Nature. There will always be power outages for one reason or another. Those who need totally uninterrupted power have bought or should buy a generator. Another benefit of Hyrum City having our own electric utility is shorter response times. We require our linemen to live close to the City to assure a fast response time which results in shorter outages. We have made great progress in making our electric utility more reliable and will continue to do so.
