

Hyrum City's First Responders provide preliminary assistance on the scene of accidents, life threatening illness or similar occurrences and

receive training to provide residents an effective & efficient medical team.

Kevin Maughan has served as Hyrum City's Fire Chief for many years and has recently retired. Blake Christensen served as the Assistant Fire Chief along with Kevin. Dog Reminder - This time of year includes complaints about dogs barking, being aggressive to runners and walkers, being off leash when not on their property, leaving waste on others' property, and being in public places where dogs are not allowed. All dogs are required to be kept under control by leash, chain, or other means of physical control when off the owner's property. Dog owners are also responsible to prevent excessive barking, molesting passerby's, chasing vehicles etc. Please be a responsible dog owner and considerate to those around you.

Rate Increase - As most of you are already aware power costs have become very volatile over the past couple of years. City power purchase costs have increased over 13% just in the last year. Power prices are significantly higher due to weather conditions, and a national energy shortage. Also, the cost of transformers, wire, conduit, power poles etc. have doubled in price during this time. The Mayor and City Council had the foresight to authorize an electrical rate study to be conducted earlier this year to ensure it could continue to provide reliable power to its residents at an affordable power rate.

Over the last several months the City has worked with a power consulting firm to review Hyrum City's power rates and analysis the cost of service. The recommended rate adjustments have been made based on overall revenue and cash reserve needs of the City's electric utility. The consultant recommended an increase to electrical rates of 12% increase for residential customers and 15% to 19% increase for commercial and industrial customers. These increases are necessitated by increasing costs, including wholesale power costs and capital improvement needs, through the Study Period that negatively impact Hyrum's financial results and level of cash reserves.

On October 1, 2022, the new power rates will go into effect and will be Hyrum City's first electrical rate increase since 2010. The rates charged for electric service by Hyrum, combined with other operating and non-operating revenues, must be sufficient to meet the cost of providing services to Hyrum's retail customers. This is necessary to ensure the long-term financial health of Hyrum. The cost of providing electric service consists of normal operating expenses such as purchased power, distribution functions, customer and administrative functions, system depreciation expenses, capital improvements, and other non-operating expenses.

You will notice your utility bill will have a separate line item "PPAC" that will show \$0.00. The Power Purchase Adjustment Clause (PPAC) will be adjusted at the end of each budget year and will either increase or decrease for the next year depending on the actual and forecasted power purchase costs. PPAC is an adjustable-rate component that will help ensure Hyrum City does not over or under charge its customers "our residents".

Cross Connections & Backflow – You Can Affect the Quality of the Water You Drink! Many public drinking water systems are contaminated each year by pollutants or contaminants that backflow into the water system through unprotected cross-connections. Identifying and eliminating or protecting cross connections is a matter of public health.

What is a Cross Connection? A cross connection is a physical connection (piping configuration) between the public drinking water system and anything else, including another water supply that can allow pollutants or contaminants to back flow into the public drinking water system.

How to Protect Your Home Drinking Water? Would you knowingly drink water that is contaminated with the chemicals used on your lawns and gardens? We all know pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers, along with strong cleaning chemicals, are toxic and possibly fatal if ingested. What you may not know is that you could put these chemicals into your drinking water accidentally.

Normally, water flows to your home from the public drinking water system. However, under certain conditions, water can actually flow in a reverse direction. This is known as backflow. This can be caused by back pressure, from a boiler or a non-potable lawn irrigation system. It may be a back-siphonage that is caused when there is a loss of pressure in the water distribution system caused by a high withdrawal of water. Examples are as in a shutdown of the water main lines or plumbing system, or a

high-water demand, as in the use of fire hydrants. This reduction of water pressure can create a vacuum in the piping, causing a sprinkler system, garden hose or other water outlet to siphon dirty or contaminated water back into the public water system. This backflow can cause health problems if ingested.

To help protect your drinking water from backflow, remember these simple tips:

- 1. Keep the end of all your hoses clear from any contaminations.
- 2. Don't submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks, ponds, etc.
- 3. Don't use lawn or garden spray attachments without a backflow prevention device or assembly.
- 4. Don't connect drain lines from water softeners or other treatment systems directly into the sewer drains.
- 5. Don't use a hose to unplug a toilet or blocked sewer line, etc.
- 6. Install hose bib type vacuum breakers on all threaded faucets in your home.
- 7. Some homes may already be equipped with built-in vacuum breakers; all newer washing machines already have one built in.
- 8. Install approved backflow prevention assemblies on all underground lawn irrigation systems.
